## LEARNING PLATFORMS - updated 4/27/25

To write a good book (a great book!) consider committing yourself to learning the craft of writing, and if interested in selling your books, consider learning about the business of publishing in the children's book world. I personally write and illustrate and in an overlapping fashion I continue to take classes and build my skills. In other words, I don't wait to create work until I have learned everything I think I need to learn. If I did that, I would never create anything. But do it *your* way – find the best way to learn that works for you.

**Storyteller Academy** is an online learning platform founded by award-winning author and illustrator Arree Chung. It offers comprehensive courses and resources for aspiring children's book writers and illustrators. The academy provides a structured curriculum that guides students through the creative process, from developing ideas to crafting compelling stories and illustrations. Courses are taught by industry professionals and cover various aspects of children's book creation, including writing, illustrating, and publishing.

In addition to its educational offerings, Storyteller Academy fosters a supportive community where members can connect, share their work, and receive feedback. This collaborative environment aims to help creatives refine their skills and achieve their goals in children's literature.

However, it's important to note that Storyteller Academy announced its closure in early 2025. Founder Arree Chung decided to close the online school to focus on personal well-being and other interests. Despite this, the academy has continued to offer workshops and live classes through February 2025, with access to courses available to annual members until that time. 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#### SCBWI (Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators)

SCBWI stands for Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators. It's the largest professional organization specifically for writers, illustrators, and translators who create content for children and young adults. Founded: 1971 by authors Stephen Mooser and Lin Oliver. What SCBWI does:

- Provides networking opportunities (both online and in-person).
- Offers grants, awards, and mentorships to emerging and established creators.

- Hosts regional and international conferences great for workshops, critiques, and meeting editors, agents, and fellow creators.
- Publishes industry resources like The Bulletin, The Book, and various guides on publishing and marketing.
- Supports diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives in children's literature.

Membership includes:

- Access to exclusive events, webinars, and meetups.
- Opportunities to get work critiqued or considered by publishers through special SCBWI programs.
- Discounts on conferences and workshops.

Who it's for:

- Authors (traditionally published, self-published, or aspiring).
- Illustrators.
- Translators of children's books.
- Anyone working in children's publishing fields.

Many events are recorded with recordings made available for a short period of time after the webinar (check each topic's description to check about that). **Researching Children's Book Awards** (what it takes to have your book considered for the award, but more importantly, which book has won in the past...then you may want to read reading as many of those as you have time and can find in your library):

#### 1. Newbery Medal

Awarded annually to the author of the most distinguished contribution to American literature for children.

#### 2. Caldecott Medal

## CRITIQUES - updated 4/27/25

In a recent copy of *Poets & Writers* about critique groups, "... Constructive feedback helps writers recognize their strengths and weaknesses, [and] consider new revision strategies..."

**About critique groups** (typically self-arranged and no cost; you critique each other's work on an ongoing basis with the goal of creating a "polished" well-developed version of your story. Every group operates differently so check in with the group leader about the structure and any questions you may have): You may want to check to see if any of the information on SCBWI CenCal region's web pages is of interest to you:

**Paid Professional Critiques:** Often when you register for a writer's conference you may be offered an optional add-on for an additional charge for a bit of time with an industry professional.

They are all structured differently so read the descriptions carefully. Variations may include: Online-only or in-person only \* AND/OR there may be with one professional and just you OR there may be with one professional with a small group.

The purpose of this time will vary significantly so again, read the descriptions carefully. Some offer time for you to **Pitch** them your story; others will allow you time to read your **first page**. Sometimes you can find a paid written critique where you will mail in your manuscript before the conference and the industry expert will review and comment on it in writing before it is returned to you at the conference.

TIP: It seems as if EVERYBODY wants time with a professional so these options often sell out quickly. Do your homework (who do you want time with?) and try to register immediately as soon as registration opens. Have a backup choice ready in case your first choice is sold out by the time you register.
